

More than twenty years ago, after the fall of the Berlin Wall, epochal changes of historic significance started in South East Europe. The nature, scale, and implications of the transformation of the Balkans countries during the process of transition has rare precedents in world history. They had to face the dual challenges of radical societal modification and the need to reverse the decline of economic activities that had characterized the last communist period.

While Albania, Bulgaria and Romania were facing the first steps of transition to democracy and market economy, the violent collapse of the former Yugoslavia reported on European soil the ghosts of the past with a long war and population displacements.

Today, twenty years later, these problems are relegated to the past century and the new countries, in collaboration with the European Union, are overcoming internal divisions and weaknesses. The Adriatic-Balkan area is quickly assuming its rightful position in Europe: after Romania and Bulgaria, also other countries are moving ahead towards integration into the European Union. In the two-days Conference historians, economists and sociologists will provide direct evidence and scientific reports on various aspects of the transition, analyzing the transformation of the last decades and discussing the main forms and perspectives of the integration process.
